Following in the footsteps of a truly great person is a daunting task. As I assumed the leadership of Prairie Rivers of Iowa from Erv Klaas I knew I had my work cut out for me. Under Erv's leadership, Prairie Rivers of Iowa had gone from the "survival stage" to the "self-actualization stage." In 2014 we look forward to our partnership with Story County Extension as we develop a Central Iowa Local Foods Program. One focus for this program will promote better food choices by establishing community gardens throughout Central Iowa and by engaging schools, businesses and municipalities in gardening for fun and health.

So what is ahead in 2014: (1) we will continue to promote our local communities along the Lincoln High way Heritage Byway and to educate our young people about natural resources and sustainability. The <u>IOWA DNR FORESTRY FIRE PROGRAM</u> is a subunit of the Iowa DNR Forestry Bureau. This team specializes in helping Iowans with fire use and suppression.

Prairie Rivers of Iowa assists the DNR and local rural fire departments in acquiring federal excess equipment for wild land fire preparation, readiness and control and in providing training to firefighters, natural resource professionals and private citizens in prescribed and wild land fire fighting techniques.





The <u>LINCOLN HIGHWAY HERITAGE BYWAY</u>, which celebrated the 100th anniversary of the historic Lincoln Highway, is a community-driven statewide initiative to "tell the story of the places and people of the byway".

Prairie Rivers of Iowa coordinates the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway, Iowa's longest and most historic byway. Celebrating its 100th anniversary in 2013, the Lincoln Highway continues to be a strong engine for local economies and an enduring symbol of civic pride in communities across the state.

The KIDS ON THE BYWAY program offers authentic learning experiences to lowa elementary school students by using natural and historical resources found along the Lincoln Highway. These resources are used to used to enhance school currirculum and incorporate environmental education outside of the classroom.





The <u>CENTRAL IOWA LOCAL FOODS</u> program's strategic approach is to start by developing multiple projects in 2013. An advisory board was selected to begin planning its strategic direction.

Current projects:

Grow Your Small Market Farm™ is a business planning program that helps potential and existing local farm and food producers learn the business skills needed to create and strengthen their farm business ventures.



The <u>School and Community Gardens</u> program, in cooperation with numerous community partners, develops and coordinates school-based community gardens to benefit students and teachers at area schools.



The <u>LOG PRODUCTS</u> program specializes in providing lowa grown, lowa mandufacatured, white oak logs that do not require any chemical or preservative treatment to be naturally decay resistant. Prairie Rivers continues to partner with lowa County Conservation Boards to build unique log cabins that are environmentally sustainable and have the durability to last generations.

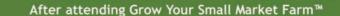

The <u>URBAN FORESTRY</u> program is community-based, expanding the knowledge of proper tree maintenance for an urban city forest.

This program focuses on supplying three growing communities (Ames, Ankeny, and Waukee) the tools to better manage their forest resources, including developing tree management plans, demonstrating the value of urban forests to municipal leaders and citizens, and networking and engaging volunteers.

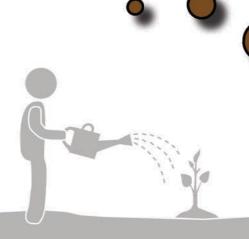

Iowa DNR Forestry Fire Program

The lowa Forestry Bureau within the DNR has worked with the United States Forest Service (USFS) for over sixty years to deliver financial, technical and related assistance to lowa's rural fire departments to assist them with wildland fire fighting. This partnership has expanded to training firefighters, natural resource professionals and private citizens in the utilization of prescribed fire to encourage the management of fire dependent ecosystems such as oak woodlands, savannas and prairies. Training wildland fire fighting techniques and protocols has also expanded to ensure that prescribed burns can be combated if they escape the prescription area. Forest Service regulations require that fire training be presented by instructors that meet the National Wildfire Cooperative Group (NWCG) standard.

Major Accomplishments

- 85 New Students certified for S-130/S-190/L-180 beginning courses for Wildland and Prescribed Fire fighting
- 249 Students attended the annual refreshers course to maintain status from S-130/S-190/L-180 courses
- 65 Pack Tested, a physical fitness test for wildland firefighters (3 mile walk in 45 minutes with a 45lb pack)
- 92 New Students, mostly fire departments with new training, on fighting Iowa Grass Fires.
- Fighting wildland fires requires specialized equipment. Rural fire departments often operate with limited equipment budgets. The lowa Forestry Bureau and the United States Forest Service (USFS) have assisted lowa's fire departments by obtaining no cost federal excess equipment that can be utilized or converted to meet the wildland fire fighting needs of specific fire departments. The ability to screen and procure federal excess equipment requires special authorization to meet USFS and Department of Defense Standards.
- 102 Red Carded Firefighters, a qualification card given once a firefighter has taken S-130/S-190/L-180 and pack test)
- 4 students advanced to National Fire Training S-230
- Supported fire education efforts nationally
- Prairie Rivers of Iowa assists the DNR and local rural fire departments in acquiring federal excess
 equipment for wildland fire preparation, readiness and control and to provide training to firefighters,
 natural resource professionals and private citizens in prescribed and wildland fire fighting techniques.







Future

We look forward to continuing to educate and train wildland firefighters. We will continue to offer taining courses, maintaining weather stations, and obtaining equipment that can be utilized or converted for fire department needs.

The Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway celebrated the 100th Anniversary of the Lincoln Highway with a busy and exciting 2013!

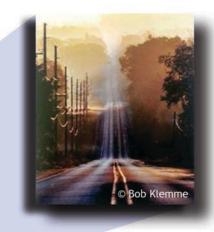
Major Accomplishments

- The Iowa Department of Transportation (DOT) approved our proposed three-year project to develop a revised Corridor Management Plan (CMP) for the Byway. This document will guide short-and long-term Byway efforts and is a critical requirement for securing national status for the Byway.
- Sponsored the first-ever Lincoln Highway photo competition at the State Fair. Bob Klemme won first place with "Lincoln Highway Sunrise," a beautiful photograph of the sunrise between Mount Vernon and Cedar Rapids.
- The Byway was featured in The Iowan and Our Iowa magazines, on Iowa Public Radio, and in local news coverage across the state during the year. Prairie Rivers of Iowa assisted journalists and reporters in writing their stories and connecting with Iowans to interview about the Byway.
- Hosted many travelers from across the United States and from around the world, especially through the national Lincoln Highway Association Centennial Auto Tour (starting in New York), the LH2013 Tour (with participants from as far away as Norway, Germany, and Sweden!), and other auto and motorcycle tours.
- Requested and received a signed proclamation from Governor Branstad and the declaration of October 31 as "Lincoln Highway Centennial Day" in Iowa.
- Staff supported local communities and organizations in promoting their attractions along the Byway, assisted the Iowa Lincoln Highway Association, and represented the Byway at events throughout Iowa.
- Took on the responsibility of editing the Iowa Lincoln Highway Association newsletter, which is distributed to hundreds of readers quarterly.
- Byway Facebook presence reached thousands of viewers and over 500 fans throughout 2013.
- The Lincoln Highway was celebrated at the Iowa State Fair with two butter sculptures: a Lincoln Highway map and a sculpture of Abraham Lincoln, located right next to the famous butter cow in the Agriculture Building.













Future

We anticipate 2014 will bring us new connections, new projects, and continued support to our stakeholders throughout the state. We will be diving deeper into our Corridor Management Plan and developing more opportunities for interpretation and enhancing connections across the byway and state. Plans are in the works for a new program that will link local businesses and the people traveling the byway, with our key goal always in mind to conserve and protect our resources. In the 2012-2013 school year, Prairie Rivers of Iowa piloted a science and environmental education program using the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway as a resource for elementary school teachers and their students. There are a total of 159 participating 4th and 5th grade students, with 12 total hours committed to teacher planning and debriefing meetings.

Major Accomplishments

• Successes so far include providing relevant environmental education resources for the teachers, either bringing in or exposing the students to 47 total experts, pairing resources along the Lincoln Highway to connect with school curricula and providing engaging and authentic learning opportunities for students.

In this pilot year, we....

- Developed a program to support science, environmental, and history education for students by assisting teachers in connecting with scientists, conservationists, and other experts along the byway.
- Created a four-day camp experience at the end of the school year with greater immersion in environmental education, Lincoln Highway history, agriculture, and other experiences.
- Coordinated three school-year units connecting the Lincoln Highway's varied resources to students. Units culminated with authentic learning experiences at locations along the Lincoln Highway. All experiences are designed to integrate with in-class learning and are led by trained professionals.
- Provided substitute teacher coverage for planning days with teachers to ensure that Kids on the Byway
 instruction is outcome-based and tied to district and lowa Core curriculum standards.
- Completed the pilot year of *Kids on the Byway* and evaluated the implementation and effectiveness of the program throughout the year.
- Held our first Kids Conservation Camp in June focusing on locations along the Byway in Boone, Story, and Marshall Counties. Elementary and middle school students traveled the Lincoln Highway to explore environmental conservation, responsible stewardship of our natural resources, local history, and community service.









For the 2013-2014 school year, we have:

- Applied and successfully received a REAP grant to expand the program adding two new schools, North Tama Elementary and Meeker Elementary for 2013-2014, piloted with 4th and 5th graders.
- Received the 2013 National Lincoln Highway Association Educator of the Year award for our Kids on the Byway program, connecting Iowa's history and natural resources to elementary school students through the Lincoln Highway.
- Expanded and added two new schools, North Tama Elementary and Meeker Elementary.



Future

With the goal to eventually take this program across Iowa, we are reaching out to future potential school partners in hopes of connecting more schools, students, and teachers with the Lincoln Highway's natural, historical, and agricultural resources in ways that directly support school learning goals.

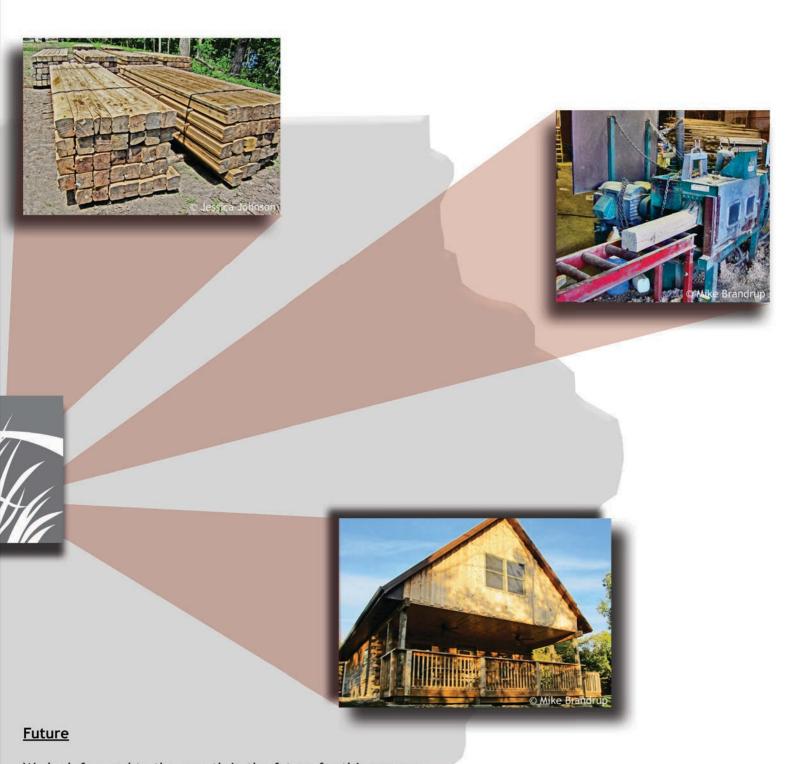
Having Prairie Rivers of Iowa as a parent organization and partner has been important to the success of Prairie Rivers of Iowa Log Products (PRLP). Prairie Rivers of Iowa has provided the fiscal management for the program along with help in marketing and designing of sale and promotional materials.

Major Accomplishments

- Having a source for white oak logs in inventory and having the ability to produce molded logs on demand, has made the supply side of PRLP much more flexible and manageable.
- Hamilton County Conservation Board (HCCB) built a log cabin in 2012 using materials purchased from Prairie Rivers of Iowa Log Products (PRLP). PRLP was able to work with HCCB to put together financial models that demonstrated the financial viability of building cabins and their potential return on rentals.
- In February of 2013, HCCB purchased materials for five more cabins. Three of the cabins were constructed at Little Wall Lake Park and an additional cabin was built in Briggs Woods Park. The remaining cabin is to be started at Briggs Woods Park in the summer of 2014. These cabins were built by Dave Scott Construction and were built as "turnkey" contracts.
- Because HCCB Cabins were to be rented to the public, the newly enforceable State of Iowa Commercial Energy Efficiency Standards had to be met. Working with a small architectural firm in Des Moines, a revised design was developed that would allow PRLP materials to be used in an energy efficient manner.
- As part of the revising design work, the question of structural design issue was raised. A structural engineer was retained to review the log cabin plans. The result of the review by the engineer was that the cabins would meet Iowa Commercial Energy Efficiency Standards.
- There is a national quality standard for log cabin logs. As a result when building codes require "structurally graded logs" to meet building codes, all logs must be certified by a professional structural log grader. We were able to identify these log grading standards and determine PRLP logs do meet the national standard. However, in order for these logs to be certified, the logs must be inspected by a certified structural log grader, and that grading must take place at the site of manufacture. The end result of the logs grading process is that it can be done, at an additional cost, and our logs are and will be produced in accordance with national standards.

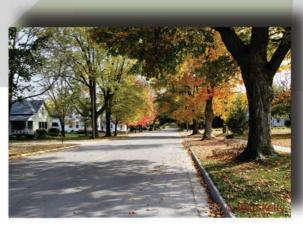

The evolution of this business from a quasi-governmental concern formerly funded through the USDA into a now independent service provider over the last 2 ½ years has been very fulfilling to be a part of. The overall business of Prairie Rivers of Iowa has been evolving into more of a service model.

Prairie Rivers' financial condition has been an interesting journey in 2013. We had carefully budgeted revenues and expenses and monitored our situation on an ongoing basis. Our monthly reports have shown solid growth in income and tightly managed expenses. However, twice in 2013, continuity of billings and collections from our clients and partners left us in a temporary tight financial situation. The staff carefully managed us through these circumstances, and has done an analysis of what occurred. This has been reviewed by the executive committee and the staff and board are continuing to monitor this in 2014.

As the 2014 budget was created, a very thorough review of monthly cash inflows and outflows was done, highlighting when potential cash flow difficulties might occur. Additional planning in advance billings, review of aging of invoices, and full staff involvement in billings and collections of services that each staff person is involved in should produce improvements in cash flow as well as the bottom line.

It is exciting to be a part of this vital growing organization. We are becoming increasingly recognized for what we do. Everyone in our organization is looking for opportunities to grow revenues and add value in all our relationships.

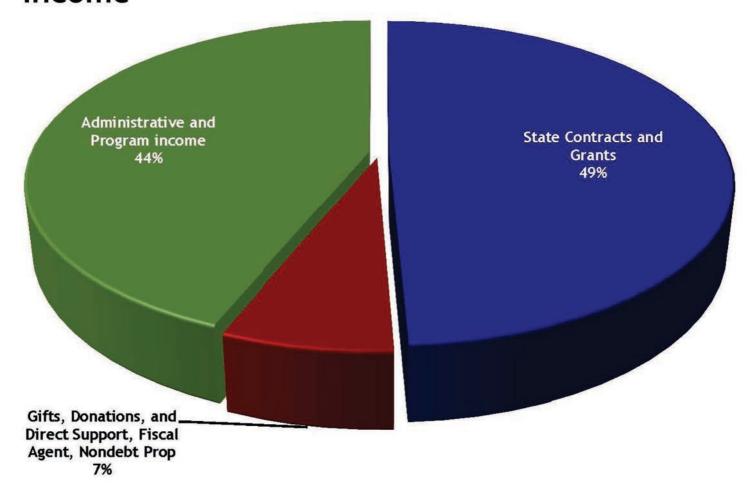

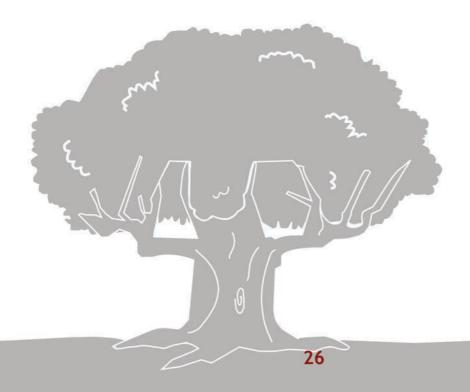

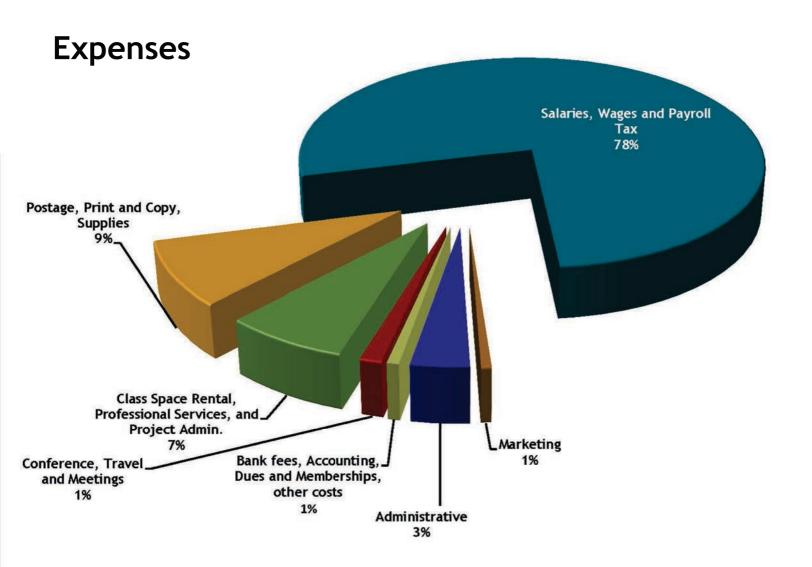
