WATER QUALITY

DAN HAUG, WATER QUALITY SPECIALIST

Clean water depends on clear information to guide land stewardship efforts at both the local and state level. Prairie Rivers of Iowa works closely with Story County Conservation and the City of Ames to monitor water quality in local rivers, make sense of the data, and provide opportunities for volunteers to get out on the water and make a difference. We educate people across the state about land and water with a mix of serious analysis and fun videos.

WATER MONITORING IN STORY COUNTY

- Published monthly water quality updates on 18 stream sites in Story County, including 10 sites that PRI monitors
- Analyzed volunteer data, lab results, and biological surveys and published a 40-page annual report
- Shared water quality data with the Iowa DNR for inclusion in the 2026 statewide assessment
- Organized quarterly meetings to coordinate monitoring with local partners and took field trips to see projects that are making a difference for water quality
- Created an interactive map to share results from water quality "snapshot" events in both Polk and Story counties

ANALYSIS OF WATER DATA FROM ACROSS IOWA

- Used fertilizer data to compare nitrogen application rates to recommendations, and estimated the impact of nitrogen rates on water quality
- Compared bacteria data from Iowa lakes and rivers to global benchmarks
- Evaluated progress metrics for the Iowa Nutrient Reduction Strategy
- Analyzed seasonal water quality patterns in the Raccoon River
- Contributed figures to the Central Iowa Source Water Resource Assessment



EVENTS

- Handled registration for PACRAT (Paddle and Cleanup Rivers Around Town) on May 3rd
 - 33 volunteers removed 3,200 pounds of trash from loway Creek!
- Prepared kits and trained student volunteers to test water quality at multiple sites in Ames as part of a multi-county spring snapshot event on May 20th
- Organized two fall volunteer events to test dissolved oxygen and survey invertebrates
- Joined a panel discussion in Cedar Rapids to share lessons from the Story County monitoring program
- Gave presentations to the 4H Fishing Club, Iowa Project AWARE, Story County Master Gardens, watershed management authorities, a sustainable agriculture class at ISU, and the League of Women Voters

OUTREACH

- Produced "Our Nitrogen Moment," a series of 12 short videos about the nitrogen cycle. Three of the videos received over 700 views on YouTube
- Produced a rapid-response video explaining high nitrate levels affecting Des Moines-area drinking water (800+ Instagram views).
- Published 11 articles about water on our Conservation Connection Blog



POLLINATOR CONSERVATION

Prairie Rivers of Iowa coordinates the Ames 10-Year Pollinator Plan and guides its implementation. In 2025, we expanded resources, education, and community participation in pollinator habitat restoration.

SEED BANK LAUNCH

- Launched the Prairie Seed Bank in August, offering over 30 native plant species sourced from commercial producers and local habitats. Seeds are weighed, labeled, and made available for a free-will donation.
- Though separate from the Ames Pollinator Plan, it is a powerful complementary resource, giving residents an accessible way to plant quality habitat.

HABITAT & FIELD DAYS

- Improved prairies on private lands, including preparation and seeding at the Brandrupt property
- Tabled at events such as EcoVision and Nevada PTA STEAM Night
- Helped host/plan field days
 - Prairie seeding with Boone SWCD and NRCS
 - Seed harvest with Project Wingspan and Story County Conservation

MONARCH MAGIC EVENT


- PRI organized the third annual Monarch Magic at Ada Hayden Heritage Park on Sep 6th
- 100 attendees
- 14 partner organizations
- 20 volunteers contributed 80 hours
- 69 books given away by Raising Readers
- Shifted from monarch tagging to iNaturalist observations due to low populations and concerns about handling the few wild monarchs caught



POLLINATOR FRIENDLY AMES


PRI facilitates this volunteer group and works closely with the City of Ames to implement the Ames Pollinator Friendly Plan.

- Decided on an official logo and sticker
- Designed a brochure with general information
- Created Webpages to help distribute resources to accomplish plan goals
- Created a Pesticide Free Pledge, Pollinator Habitat Report form, and a Pollinator Self-Survey
- Designed many educational materials, including a How-to Guide, Top 12 Pollinator Plants, and Invasive Plants flyer
- Created an iNaturalist project for the Ames area to record observational data on pollinators

BYWAYS: LANDSCAPE, HISTORY, & CULTURE

JEANIE HAU, BYWAYS COORDINATOR

Prairie Rivers of Iowa manages both the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway, a National Scenic Byway and Iowa Valley Scenic Byway, supporting historic preservation, tourism, interpretation, and community storytelling.

NEW FUNDING

- \$5,000 from Iowa Historical Society Inc. to begin a full inventory of the Lincoln Highway Museum in Grand Junction
- \$5,000 from Dean J. King Family Foundation toward a three-kiosk byways project in the community of Logan.
- \$500 from Discover Ames for "A Celebration of the Reed-Niland Corner" event

TRAVELING EXHIBIT

- Continued to tour the audiovisual exhibition telling the story of the national Lincoln Highway, "Promise Road: How the Lincoln Highway Changed America," to libraries and museums. Exhibit available upon request.

INTERPRETATION,

MAPPING, & SIGNAGE

- Completed the Survey of National Historic Register Sites along the Lincoln Highway Heritage Byway. Pdf is available on website.
- Built an Online App for Iowa Valley Scenic Byway Audio Tour
- Updated the byways route maps in ArcGIS Pro and shared updates with the Iowa DOT.
- Created a "My Google Map" for Lincoln Highway website with construction detours.

PRESERVATION

- Continued to support the city of Tama in preserving the Lincoln Highway Bridge
- Filmed and edited the Reed Station Oral/Video History Project. A pilot "Tales on the byway" can be seen at: <https://youtu.be/JpqMf-txNDE>
- Helped establish the Reed-Niland Corner, Inc., non-profit to assume ownership and operation of the historic café, motel, museum, and apartment complex.
- Working with SHPO and Preservation Consultants for nominating the Reed-Niland Corner for a National Designation.

SEEDLING MILE PROJECT LINN COUNTY

- Worked with County Engineers, County Conservation, and County Historic Preservation Commission to replace signs marking the Seedling Mile Begin and End signs, making the roadway safer.
- Currently working on an Iowa DOT project to replace the existing Seedling Mile Interpretive sign at the Abbe Creek School Museum rest area. Working with the Linn County Historic Preservation Commission and the County Conservation Department. The kiosks will expand on Lincoln Highway information and things to do in Linn County. A Seedling Mile monument will be relocated to this location as well.
